Since 1993, Volunteer Advocates in Grayson County have continued to impact the children and families in Grayson County. With their unwavering commitment and passion for the children in our community, CASA of Grayson County has affected the lives of thousands of children and families. Court Appointed Special Advocates are ordinary people with the desire to make an impact. We like to call them our Humble Heroes.

CASA Guiding Principles

CASA of Grayson County recognizes the importance of family preservation and/or reunification:

- It is in a child's best interests to remain with their family of origin when safely possible.
- Acknowledges that children experience trauma when separated from their family of origin.
- If a child is removed from their family of origin, it is in the child's best interests to be reunified with their family of origin as soon as safely possible.
- If a child is removed from their family of origin, the child should be placed with a relative whenever safely possible and in the child's best interests.
- Strengthening families, through recommendations for services, supports, visitation and communications, is in the child's best interests to achieve stability and/or reunification.
- Requires and demonstrates respect for the parents and all parties associated with the case.
- Ensures that information regarding the family's strengths is incorporated into reports to the court.
- Ensures that information regarding the child's wishes is incorporated into reports to the court.
- When a court determines a child cannot be safely reunified with their family of origin consistent with legal mandates, another permanent placement is in a child's best interests.

CASA of Grayson County recognizes the importance of diversity, equity and inclusion:

- All children regardless of age, race, ethnicity, national origin (ancestry), color, religion (creed), gender, gender expression, sexual orientation, disability or physical challenge, or socioeconomic status should be safe, have a permanent home and an opportunity to thrive.
- Acknowledges the existence of implicit bias and takes steps to minimize and/or eliminate implicit bias.
- Demonstrates an understanding of disproportionality impacting children who are in the child protection system due to allegations of abuse or neglect.



Children Served by CASA within DFPS Legal Responsibility 2




DEMOGRAPHICS

CASA VOLUNTEERS ADVOCATE FOR LIFETIME CHILD CONNECTIONS

Permanency for children in care is ultimately determined by orders issued by the court. CASA volunteers advocate for permanency through their recommendations. CASA volunteers first advocate for reunification when safe and possible. If reunification is not safe or possible, CASA volunteers advocate for the child to be adopted by, or live with, other relatives or family friends. If that is also not possible, CASA volunteers work towards adoption by a non-relative. No matter what, CASA volunteers will keep in contact with the support network until the case closes so that everyone continues to put the child's best interests first.


Demographics of 46 Active Volunteers in FY2023







How closely are the demographics of the children your program serves represented by the demographics of your volunteers?




What specific communities or groups within your service area could you target with new recruitment efforts?


CASA of Grayson County Activity Instances FY2023: 5,290

CFE is a team-based approach between Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA), Child Protective Services (CPS) and Community-Based Care (CBC) providers to identify, locate and engage with family members and fictive kin in the creation and development of a lifetime network for young people in the foster care system, and their parents or caregivers.


FY2024 Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) Funds as of 1/16/2024










FY2024 Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) Funds as of 7/18/2024
